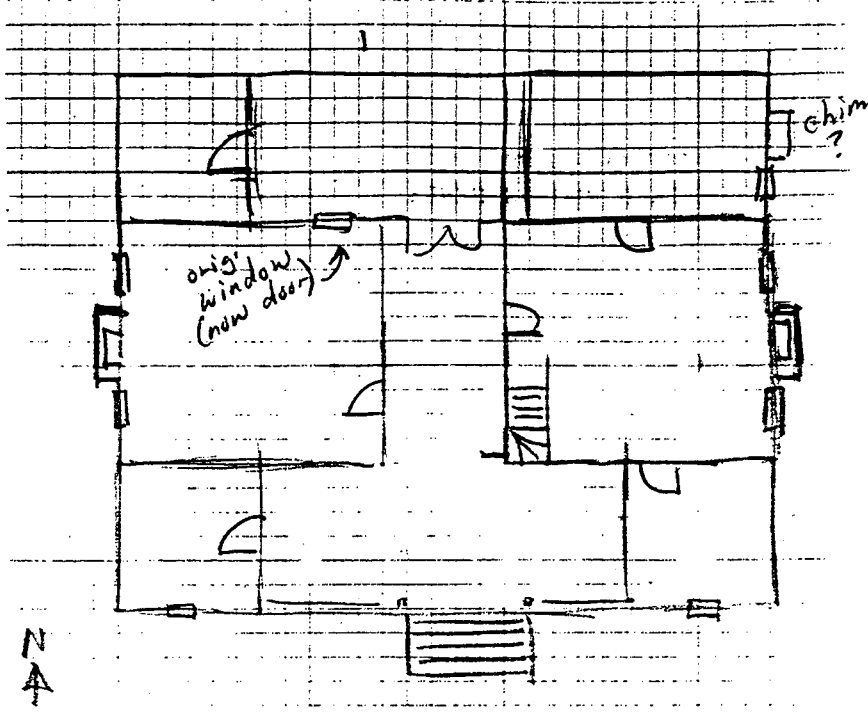

Dear Mr. Gamble:

You asked about the chain of title and purchase prices of my mother's home in Autauga County. According to family tradition the house has remained in the family since homestead and thus purchase prices likely would not have occurred. I do not have the deeds here, but they likely will give dates of transfer. I can supply the following information:

We have two landgrants signed by J. Q. Adams which by family tradition are the original grants to the land associated with the house. There is one small mystery here: the names on the grants are not those of any known members of the family. The writing on the grants is faded and hard to read, but I think the name on the grant of 1825 is Mills Harrod and the name on the grant of 1828 is \_\_\_ Guff. Family tradition has always referred to the house in terms of the women in the family since it was passed from mother to oldest daughter. I shall, however list names of man and wife to help you with your records. The first owners were reported in family records as Jeremiah and Nancy Lasiter (I remember that Nancy was born in 1799) (both are buried in the family cemetery near the house). Jeremiah Lasiter is listed as a stockholder from Autauga County in the Real Estate Banking Company of South Alabama of 1838 (See page 31 of Selma: Her Institutions and Her Men by John Hardy). The next owners were Peyton and Elizabeth (Betty) Anne Whetstone. Then came Joseph Baker Parker, Jr. and Mary Anna (or Minnie Anne - I think "Minnie" was a nick-name). For a while the house belonged to Tilly (Bates) Park, I think, and was then bought by my grandfather and grandmother (the oldest daughter of Minnie Parker). My grandparents were Annie Lee (Parker) and Carlton Clyde (C. C.) Jones.

The property then came to my parents, Minnie Evelyn (Jones) and George Edward Treadwell. We moved there in winter of 1946, if I remember correctly. At that time the house was in very bad repair.

This spring or summer I shall try to check the deeds to obtain more information.

### LASSITER-TREADWELL HOUSE ADDED TO HISTORIC REGISTER

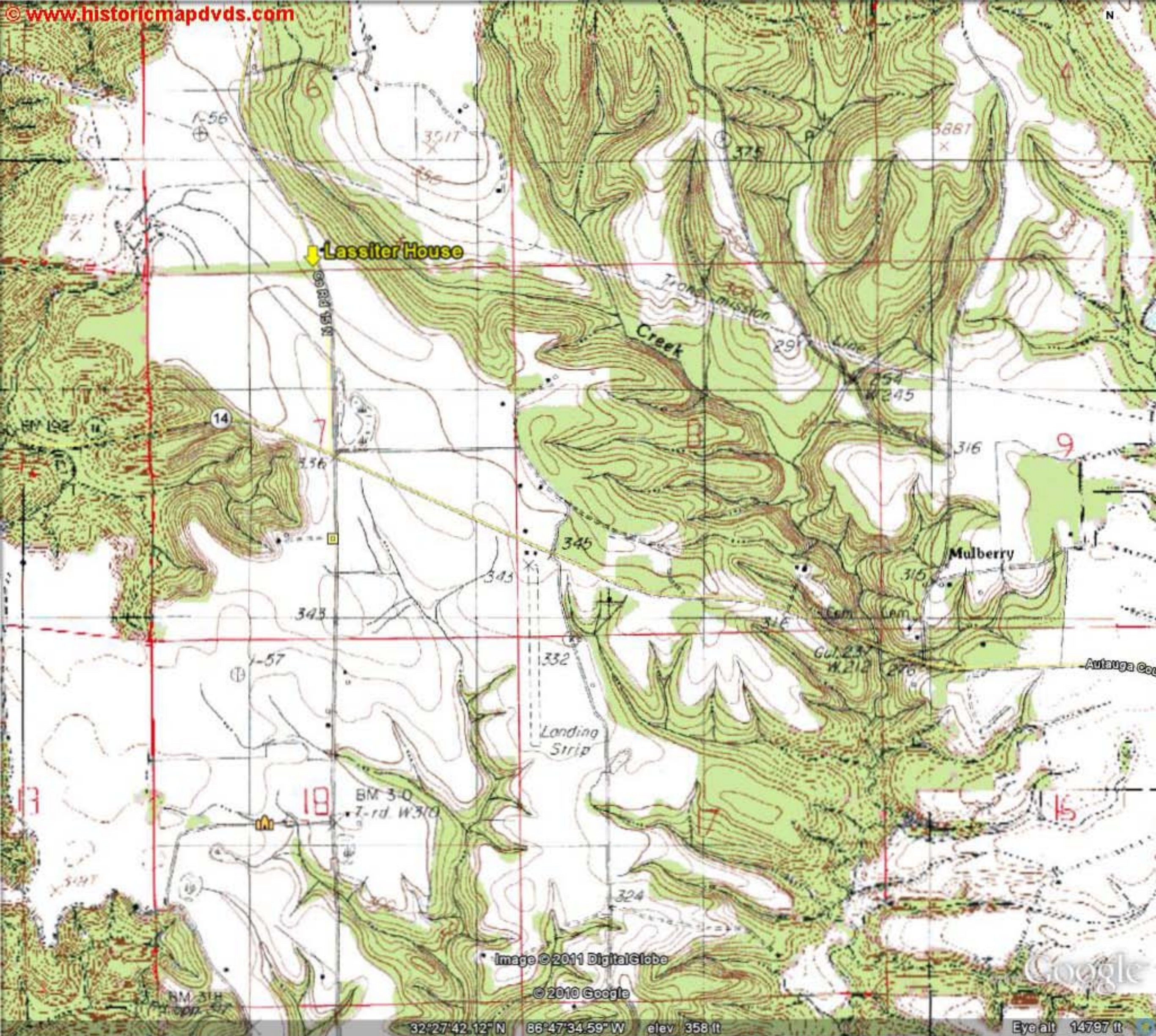
The Alabama Historical Commission announced recently that the Lassiter-Treadwell House, located in rural Autauga County, has been added to the Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage. The residence is a good representation of an early "I-House," a common house form popular during the 19th and early 20th centuries.

Characterized by its central hall plan and brick end chimneys, the Lassiter-Treadwell House has retained many of its original features including its overall shape and form, and interior details such as mantels, and door and window moldings. The house may have been constructed as early as the late 1820s, but the first recorded owners were Jeremiah and Nancy Lassiter who resided there around 1845. The current owner, George E. Treadwell of Emory, Virginia, plans to restore the building for continued use as a residence.

The Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage is a prestigious statewide listing of buildings, structures, objects, and districts that possess architectural and historical associations.

The Alabama Historical Commission is the official state agency responsible for preserving Alabama's historic resources.
