ADDITIONAL INFORMATION OF INTEREST CONCERNING THE WOODSTOCK UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

Jesse Cole Persinger was the Methodist Minister that helped to organize the Methodist Espiscopal Church South at Woodstock in 1886. From his Autobiography printed in 1988, he says When the appointments were announced in 1686, I was assigned to Woodstock and Blocton Mission.....when I arrived in Woodstock I found W. B. Martin and his wife expecting me, and they informed me that I would live with them as a member of the family. This I did for a year; no one could have been better to me than this good man and his wife.

There was no organized church at Woodstock, but several Methodist families in the community, a small railroad village, and at Green Pond, two miles further on up the railroad, so I gathered these together and organized a church in the lower story of the Masonic Hall; this floor was also used as a school house."

Br. Persinger retired in 1936, after 53 years of active service, the longest period of any minister in the history of The North Alabama Conference, which includes the Woodstock Church. He was active from 1883 to 1936, as was stated in his obituary when he died in 1953, at age 90. He had been a member of the North Alabama Conference for 70 years when he died. (from his book)

In further research, of Methodist Churches in Bibb County, we conclude that the Woodstock Methodist Church building is the oldest Methodist Church Building in Bibb County, having had continuous worship services in the same building, with structures inside and outside, still the same as when the building was originally built about 1893, after the land was purchased. It is the oldest Methodist Church building in Bibb County, Alabama with the same original structures as mentioned above.

We have not found a record of the exact date the building was built. The land was purchased in 1893, according to the deed given in the enclosed Mistory book of the church. We have been told by older people in the community that it was built about the same year as the Baptist Church nearby, both built by the same builder. We know it was built before 1900. You will

find in the Charge Conference minutes enclosed where they reported the Woodstock Church House and Church Furniture a grounds and Parsonage and furniture.

Mrs. Gertrude Burns, born in 1894 and the late Mrs. Eula Mamilton, born in 1893 tells us the Church was built by the same man at the same time as the Woodstock Baptist Church. These ladies were both active in the work of Woodstock Methodist Church. Mrs. Eula Hamilton, before her death when we interviewed her, that her older brother and sister attended the church service on the day it was dedicated. Mrs Hamilton served as postmaster of Woodstock Post Office from 1939 to 1955, She had worked in The U. S. Post Office for 20 years before she became PostMaster. She said her father, William Ellard, helped with the building of the church.

Mrs. Edna Killian Wade, was a member of the Woodstock Baptist Church. She says her grandfather was one of the carpenters who worked on building the Methodist Church. He was S. J. Hancock, who died in 1899. She said her grandfather, J. W. Rolen told her of the meetings that used to be held together with both churches* members attending. They would alternate the meeting places each Sunday.

Mrs. Gertrude Burns, who was born in 1894 and her two daughters, Willie Michols, and Merle Hayes, have been members of Woodstock Methodist Church for 67 years, having joined in 1923. The first Tuscaloosa District meeting of the Churchs' Women's Foreign Missionary Society, met in this church in 1908. Enclosures:

No records found of changes in the districk in whick Woodstock Church has served. It is in the Tuscaloosa District of The North Alabama Conference.

The following is a list of some churches serving on the same Charge as Woodstock;

1899-1900 Woodstock, Johns, Adger and Greely, with J. W. Cowan, P.C. D. L. Parish, Presiding Elder and C. R. Walters, Secretary. The first Quarterly Conference met Jan. 13, 1900 at Adger. They reported three Sunday Schools at Adger, Woodstock and Johns. Total amount of money from all sources during the year was \$747.75 with 180 members up from 152 the year be-fore Nine members had been received by certificate and two removed by certificate and two had died. They were Mrs. Hester Thorp and J. W. Hamilton.


> April 21, 1900, second Quarterly Conference, R. S. Moore was elected as Secretary, met at Greely, Ala.


> Third Quarterly Conference met, July 21, 1900 at Johns. Rev. J. W. Tucker, pastor of Morthport and South Siell was visiting and gave the worship. Dr. J. C. Jones was elected Sec. They had three Epworth Leagues -- Johns / Sumpter, Adger and Woodstock. A fourth Sunday School had been organized at Greely.

Fourth Quarterly Conference met November 19, 1900 at Adger. Sunday School Superintendents elected were; C. J. Blanken-ship, W. B. Martin and H. A. Milner. They voted to sell the old church house and seats at Adger and the proceeds be applied to the new church building at Adger.

The board of Trustees of Woodstock-Johns Charge, Tuscaloosa District, North Alabama Conference reported that Woodstock Has Church House and Church furniture and grounds valued at \$1,250.00. Deeds good containing Trust Clause Recorded at Centreville County Site Bibb County.

Parsonage and Furniture at Woodstock valued at \$75.00, Church furniture at Johns, \$75.00, no church house. Adger Charge church house and furniture and lots \$475.00 and old church \$30.00 Greely church furniture \$75.00, making a total of \$2,595.00 valued properties in the charges. Signed, P. G. Dunlap, Chairman, J. C. Jones, Secretary and Treasury. 1900-1901 Quarterly Conference Roll of members of Johns, Woodstock, Greely and Adger were; W. T. Hernden, P. C. D. L. Parrish, Presiding Elder. Stewarts were; P. G. Dunlap, C. R. Walters, Gwo.Shores, Dr. J. C. Jones, W. H. Miller, S. S. Shores, Dr. R. C. Jones, Dr. Thos. Gross, R. S. Moon, Sunday School Supts. C. J. Blankenship, W. B. Martin, and H. A. Milner. Total amount of money from all sources was \$985.00
