Solid oak pews, a 2 foot high alter rail carved around the pulpit is of poplar, black walnut and gum. Pulpit itself is of black walnut all original to the building.

A 3 foot high hickory panelling wainscoting is on all the walls in the sanctuary. The interior ceiling is covered by hickory panelling and has 3 large decorative wooden beams. From the center of these beams hang 3 chandeliers.


A wing was added to the rear in 1950 and heat and air conditioning was added in 1960.

This beautiful old church was designed and built by a German born architect named Otto Puls in 1886. The large white frame structure stands one block east of highway 231 in downtown Blountsville, Alabama.

The building is a large rectangular shaped structure with a wing connected onto the back of the sanctuary which gives it an "T" shape. The church was originally decorated in the manner of the greatest glory of English parrish churches of the fifteenth century. The building has a thrilling array of arch braces with decorative designs which adds a great deal of structural richness to it.

Approaching the church from the front, one sees a tall belfry on the left with a recessed area to the right which has a small porch. The porch is supported by four white wooden posts which have decorative woodwork at the top of each one. Upon entering the porch, there are double doors leading into the large, spaceous sanctuary. Above these doors, on the front of the building are two stained glass windows. The one immediately above the doors is a stained glass fanlight, and about twelve feet above it is a large, circular shaped stained glass window with vibrant colors and a cross inside it, which is illuminated at night. The roof of the building originally contained wood shingles, but has now been replaced with a conventional green shingle roof.

Sheet # 2 Description:

On entering the sanctuary, there is a long beige carpet leading from the front doors to the alter rail and then around the pulpit. On each side of the carpet are two long rows of pews which are made of solid oak. The two foot high alter rail is curved around the pulpit and is made of poplar, black walnut, and gum. The pulpit itself is constructed of black walnut, and is flanked on either side by two beautiful massive wooden chairs. The alter rail and pulpit are both original.

Wainscoting is used on the walls around the entire sanctuary and is about three feet high and made of hickory paneling. There are four high, Gothic style windows on each side of the sanctuary. These windows are made of colorful stained glass. The interior ceiling is covered by hickory paneling and has three large, massive, decorative wooden beams which are exposed. This adds a touch of European architecture to the building. There are three beautiful chandeliers hanging about ten feet apart from the highest point of the ceiling. In the back of the sanctuary, there are two doors which leads to the wing which is attached onto the back of the sanctuary. This wing was added in 1950 and houses six sunday school rooms, a kitchen, and a dining room. Central air conditioning and heat was added to the church in 1963. The church is currently in excellent condition.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This beautiful old church is one of the oldest in the state of Alabama. It was organized in 1818 by Reverend Ebeneezer Hearn as a point where he preached on a missionary journey through the southeast. It is told that Reverend Hearn was not afraid of hard work, and could take an axe, a hammer and a saw, and with the help of his congregation, go out and build a sturdy house of worship.

The first church was a square shaped log cabin which was located a little north of the location of the present structure. The old church had no steeple and had one big room with rough log benches which had no backs. Legs on the benches were inverted V peg legs.

The present building was constructed in 1886. It was designed and built by a German architect named Otto Puls. Mr. Puls was a native of Germany and came to the United States and settled in Chicago, Illinois, where he worked reconstructing buildings following the Chicago fire. He then moved to nearby Garden City where he woked on
