Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Griffith Home is a two story (2 above 2) frame "I" house with a one story wing in back. The home was built in 1851 by the great grandfather of the current owner. The interior woodwork and trim of the house shows rustic Federal and Greek Revival influences. Originally an L-shaped back porch ran across the back of the house and along the ell wing. In 1885, the kitchen (originally separate from the house) was torn down and replaced by a second kitchen, created by enclosing the rear portion of the long back porch.

The most significant feature of the house is the original 19th-century graining and marbelizing found throughout much of the interior. The home's appearance today is close to the original. There was major repair done in 1945 that saw new wood veneer, windows, chimneys and solid rock foundation. In 1957, there was renovation adding upstairs and downstairs bathrooms, and converting the back porch to a dining room. In 1975, the chimney in the master bedroom was replaced with brick.

On the front there are 8 windows (4 up and 4 down) double hung with 9 panes. There is a  $8 \times 12$  foot 2 story porch on the front with wood railing cut in an urn pattern. The double doors both up and downstairs onto the porch are grained to resemble oak. Both have sidelights and transom.

The foundation was originally composed of rock piers with lattice between. Today, there is rock fill between the piers. The original stone chimneys were replaced by brick (following the form of the earlier chimneys) in 1945.

Behind the house is a small 4 room frame house built in 1984 on the site of the original kitchen. To the right is a smoke house built in 1925 replacing the original. To the left (east) of the house is a 1930 barn that has been converted into a 4 room frame house in 1985. Behind the converted barn is a frame garaged and storage building built in 1985.

Dating from 1851, the Griffith Home is a two-story frame "I" house with a one-story rear wing forming an ell. It is located on 3 acres of property at the outskirts of the Summit community of Blount County. Built by Robert Griffin Griffith (1801-1854), it is the only antebellum home remaining in the community and one of the few left in the county.

The Griffith House is eligible for listing on the Alabama Register under Criterion C, architecture. It depicts a folk style common to this period, with rustic Federal and Greek Revival influences seen in the two-story center porch and the interior detailing. This addition of stylistic detailing to a common house type appeared in homes of the more affluent of the era. The most significant feature of the house is the original 19th century graining and marbelizing found throughout much of the interior.

The house has been maintained very close to its original condition. In 1885, a portion of the L-shaped rear porch, which ran along the ell wing, was enclosed to create a kitchen. Major repairs were undertaken in 1945, when new wood veneer and windows replaced deteriorated ones, rock fill replaced lattice between the rock foundation piers, and the rock chimenys were replaced with brick ones. In 1957, upstairs and downstairs bathrooms were added, and the remaining portion of the back porch was enclosed to create a dining room. The remaining rock chimney in the master bedroom was replaced with brick in 1975.

There are several outbuildings on the property, though none of these dates from the original structure. A four-room frame guest house was built behind the main structure in 1984, on the site of the original kitchen. Adjacent to this is a smokehouse built in 1925 to replace the original. On the east side of the house is a 1930 barn which was converted to a four-room house in 1985. A frame garage and storage building was constructed behind the barn in 1985.

The Griffith Home has been owned and maintained by the descendants of the Griffith family since its construction.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Built in 1851 the Griffith house is the only antebellum house remaining in the old community known as Summit and one of the few left in the county. The builder, Robert Griffin Griffith's (1801-1854) ancestors were born in Wales England. He no doubt found the beautiful hill and valley country reminiscent of his homeland. The Griffith family have been prominent farmers and merchants owning and occupying the home since it's construction. Current owners are Louise Griffith Waid and James Griffith. Mrs. Waid lives in the house alone and having no heirs she is concerned what will become of the old home after she is gone.

### Griffith Home Listed in Alabama Register

The Griffith Home in Blount County, Alabama, has recently been added to the Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage.

Built by Robert Griffith, it is the only antebellum home remaining in the community and one of the few left in the county. The structure is a two-story, frame "I" house depicting a folk style common to the antebellum period. It has rustic Federal and Greek Revival influences. The Griffith Home has been maintained close to its original condition by descendants of the Griffith family.

The Alabama Register is a prestigious statewide listing of buildings, structures, objects, and districts that possess architectural and historical significance. It is administered by the Alabama Historical Commission, the official state agency responsible for helping Alabamians preserve their historic resources.

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
