Union Grove Cemetery in Anniston's Golden Springs area, dating from the late 19th century, was added to the Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage on July 18, 1989. The cemetery and surrounding site is significant for its association with the northern Congregational missionary effort to assist Appalachian region people of the south after the Civil War.

Land for a cemetery, church and school was deeded to the Congregational school trustees in 1890. A building was constructed to be used as a Congregational church and school. This building burned twice, in 1903 and 1923, and was eventually rebuilt at a different location. The cemetery remains as a reminder of the Congregational church's efforts in the community. The people of the area were of average or low income and 82 of the graves do not have stones and are marked with brick and concrete block.

The Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage is a prestigious statewide listing of buildings, structures, objects, and districts that possess architectural or historical associations. Alabama Historical Commission

Dear Bob,

We are writing to you concerning this new matter because, having been in correspondence with you lately, you could tell us whom to write, if necessary.

A Mrs. Kathy Beason called the other day to ask if a cemetery could be designated an historic landmark. It is in the Golden Springs area of Anniston, $l_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ acres, dates from the early 1800s and a church/school was also there before burning. The cemetery was originally known as Bunkum (sp.) Hill, but is now called Union Grove. Protection is needed from teenage vandalism and a real estate firm.

Mrs. Beason went to the Anniston City Council to request financial help in cleaning the cemetery and restoring broken and knocked-over momuments. They did not grant her the help she requested, but George Monk, the City Attorney, who lives in Golden Springs, called her and offered his help. He helped her set up a trust fund for any monies raised. The Anniston Jaycees helped clear the dense underbrush and pull the monuments back into place. Enough money was raised to clean the headstones so they could be read. Concrete "bombs", as Mrs. Beason's grandmother calls them, border the property lines.

Mr. Golden, for whom Golden Springs is named, was a deacon in the church and a trustee of the school. Mrs. Beason's great-grandparents are buried there along with other early settlers. She has in her possession the property deeds even though she said the property is now designated as public land.

The realtors who want the property have built houses up to the property lines on three sides. Mrs . Beason told Ruth Mary of their offer to fence the cemetery for her, going about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch outside the concrete "bombs" onto their property. Upon hearing this, Ruth Mary urged her to inform George Monk of their offer and to have the property surveyed.

Ruth Mary referred her to Jan Ernest, at the Alabama Room in the Anniston Public Library, Dr. Grace Gates the Anniston historian, and the AlaBenton Society (s genealogical organization which specializes in old cemeteries) for research information which may be needed.

Any information or advice from the AHC would be greatly appreciated. Mrs. Beason's telephone number is 1-835-1089. We do not have her address. She has taken on this project in order to protect an historical place in Calhoun County as well as to preserve her ancestor's gravesites. She feels that authentic designation from the Commission would end the harassment and protect the cemetery. Would there have to be a sponsoring organization in order to erect an historic marker?

Thank you any help, Bob, and especially thanks for the letter about Jacksonville's St. Luke's Episcopal Church. Work has begun apparently and we hope for the best. The Snow-Felgar House is taking shape beautifully and the Joneses are extremely pleased with Garron Smith's work. Carson Jones showed Ben through the house last week. Nothing positive seems to be happening with the Ide House.

Union Grove Cemetery History of the Landmark

Joel E. Massey and his wife deeded the land to the public witnessed by J.H. Golden for which the Golden Spring community is named after. The land was used for a church, school and cemetery. The church/school was built in the 1860's and burned in 1903. The church/school was rebuilt the same year and remained there until 1923 when it burned again. The church/school was rebuilt in the spring of 1923 in a different location leaving only the cemetery at Union Grove. The original owners of the land are among those buried in the cemetery. Hopefully the cemetery can be preserved for the families of the people buried there and for the history of Union Grove.
