#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Woods-Crook-Tredaway House in Calhoun County is a twostory frame building constructed in the Greek Revival style.

Two sets per story of paired 4/4 double-hung sash windows flank a central two-story pedimented portico with an entablature resting on 4 fluted Ionic columns. To its rear, the portico roof is supported by 2 plain pilasters and 2 large brackets.

A broad set of steps gives access to the main first story entrance——a double—leaf panelled door with one upper glass light per panel. The entrance is flanked by sidelights and is topped by a transom. Small brackets found at the roofline of the structure's main block are repeated beneath the portico roof's pediment and at its side roofline.

Above the first story main entrance is a central balcony with spindle balusters which rests on large brackets like those supporting the portico roof.

In the 1920's and the 1930's additions were made to the north side of the house for bedrooms and bathrooms on both stories. At an unspecified date, rear porches were enclosed. A kitchen, which had been attached to the house at an unknown date, is now used as a bedroom.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Woods-Crook-Tredaway House in Jacksonville was constructed c. 1836 as the home of Captain Alexander Woods, Probate Judge of what was then Benton County.

Woods contracted the building job to Elbert Green Morris, a well-known builder in the area who owned a sash and door factory in Morrisville. Morris owned 1,100 slaves and used their labor in constructing the house and outbuildings from native materials.

Captain Woods sold the house in 1866 to Samuel W. Crook for \$6,500. The house remained in Crook's family until 1919 when his widow sold it to Felix S. and Louise Douthit Tredaway for \$5,500. F. S. Tredaway was a lumber dealer, and his wife was the daughter of Dr. A. J. Douthit, a local physician.

Upon the death of Louise D. Tredaway in 1980, the house passed to their only son, Floyd P. Tredaway, the present owner and occupant.

NATIONAL REGISTER Potential

When Captain Alexander Woods, Judge of Probate of Benton County decided to build his home, he contracted the job to Mr. Elbert Green Morris of Morrisville, Alabama, in 1836.

Mr. Morris was a well known contractor in the South and owned 1100 slaves. He owned a sash and door factory in Morrisville and everything was built to fit without the use of a saw.

The brick and carpentry work were done by the slaves with the large hand hewed timbers being morticed and pegged in place. The lighter pieces of lumber were nailed in place with home made nails made from steel that was smelted in the County. The iron used was also mined in the County. The sills in the house were made in one piece from huge logs. Like all colonial homes, the entire lot was enclosed by a white picket fence. The property line extended from the ditch, (between present Glazner home and Ashmore home) to the middle of what is now Washington Street.

The fountain in the front yard was placed there by the first owner. The carriage house, kitchen and milk house were all located separate and apart from the house in the rear. There was a 100 ft. deep, hand dug well at the west end of the milk house over which a windmill was later built. The fountain is still in place in its original location after being damaged by a tornado in 1944. A large oak tree, approximately 40" in diameter fell directly on the fountain but simply split it into the two parts inwhich it had been built other than damaging the arms of the statue slightly. It was put back together by a member of the Tredaway family after the storm. The milk house was converted into a guest house andthe carriage house into a garage after being used as a smoake house in the interium. The original kitchen was removed after a new kitchen was built attached to the house. The windmill was destroyed by a windstorm in the 1920's and the hand dug well was filled in the 1960's.

There is a green marble mantle in the north parlor downstairs that was shipped in from Italy when the house was built. The seven other mantles and fireplaces are intact in the house but are no longer used due to the condition of the chimneys.

Captain Alexander Woods, the original owner, sold the house to Samuel W. Crook in 1866 for the sum of \$6,500.00. The house remained in the Crook family until 1919 when Mrs. Jane P. Crook, a widow sold it to Felix S. and Louise Douthit Tredaway for the sum of \$5,500.00. Mr. Tredaway was a lumber dealer and his wife, Louise Douthit was the daughter of A.J. Douthit, M.D. a physician in Jacksonville and his wife Nancy Linder Douthit was the daughter of P. P. Linder, M.D. one of the first medical doctors in Calhoun County. Dr. A. J. Douthit's father, Mr. G.B. Douthit was a postmaster in Jacksonville and one of the pallbearers at the funeral of the "Gallant Pelham".

Upon the death of Mr. F. S. Tredaway in 1964 and Mrs. Louise D. Tredaway in 1980, the house passed to their only son, Floyd P. Tredaway, the present owner.
