#### CALVERT UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

#### REMODELING HISTORY (1889 - 2010)

**<u>1889</u>** - The Calvert United Methodist Church was built in 1889. The building was somewhat square (20 x 40) with steeple and bell tower that still stands today. (Attachment I)

The Fairford United Methodist Church was organized about the same time as the Calvert United Methodist Church. The parsonage in Fairford was occupied in 1895. It later burned; however, no one knows when the church was abandoned. The church bell was placed in a creek and later found. The bell was brought to Calvert and still hangs in the belfry of the Calvert U. Methodist Church today. It is still rung prior to church services each Sunday by the young children. The bell tower and attic has square, wooden nails that were used when the church was originally built.

Brick of the old chimney still stands in the attic of the church today. It is not known when the wood heater was removed from the center of the church. In the 50's and 60's gas heaters were used to heat the church.

**1926** - The church was remodeled by adding two Sunday school rooms on the north side and two Sunday school rooms and a porch on the south side. Each Sunday school room was approximately 12' x 12'. The sanctuary was enlarged by approximately 20' in length and new windows were installed. This work was done by Herbert Lynwood Kelly. Mr. Kelly was buried in the Calvert United Methodist Church Cemetery in 1927. (Attachment II - Floor plan)

<u>1953</u> - Sunday, October 25, was one of the most outstanding in the over half century history of Calvert Methodist Church, for on this day several hundred citizens from throughout this area, and from as far away as Louisiana, gathered to hear dedication services for the newly-installed 1700 chimes and to join in homecoming festivities with old friends complete with "dinner on the grounds."

Principal speaker of the day was Congressman Frank W. Boykin, member of the Calvert Church, who, along with George Woodyard, prominent Washington County business man, presented the chimes to the church as a memorial to their respective parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. James Boykin and the late Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Woodyard. (Attachment III News paper article on dedication of chimes)

<u>1954</u> - The Highway Department took about half of the church property; therefore, all of the old oak trees were lost. The parking lot was first paved in 1990 with a donation by Jimmy & Elouise Downey and since re-surfaced gratis by George Knapp of Knapp Construction Company.

**<u>1967</u>** - The beaded board and 2 x 4 boards were covered with paneling; adequate lighting was installed.

<u>1975</u> - One Sunday school room on the south side of the church was converted to two small restrooms. In 2009 one restroom was remodeled to meet the handicapped code.

<u>1979</u> - Hurricane Frederic damage was repaired on October 15, 1979. Insurance paid \$1,135.00. Southern Window Supply Co. replaced 6 windows, repaired steeple and other minor damage to the church for a total cost of \$1,185.00.

**<u>1986</u>** - Bobby Browning Flooring sanded and refinished floors in sanctuary for \$850.00. They also furnished and installed 28 oz. carpet over pad in vestibule, 3'runner down center aisle, across front and on alter for \$1,230.00.

**<u>1986</u>** - E. Carpenter refinished and repaired alter rail (3 sections) for \$275.00. The alter rail is a focal point in the church.

On August 28, 1986 the pulpit was refinished and repaired for \$150.00.

<u>1986</u> - Lee Parnell installed vinyl under pinning on 4/23/86 for \$700.00. This under pinning was damaged by Hurricane Ivan and replaced in 1990 with Old Red Virginia brick.

1989 - The exterior of the church was sanded and loose board replaced.

1989 - The church was Incorporated.

**1989** - In 1989 the two Sunday school rooms on the north side were remodeled and enlarged to a 28 x 32' fellowship hall. The doors used to enter the Sunday school rooms are now used to enter the fellowship hall. The ceiling still indicates the size of the two Sunday school rooms with beams; however additional space was added to make a room large enough for fellowship events. A porch with canopy was added to enter the fellowship hall. Anita Woodyard Stallings contributed \$10,000 to begin the project; thus the Anita Stallings Fellowship Hall. An additional a\$4,500 was donated to complete the project.

Family & friends of Marion Stabler donated \$180 to construct a wooden ramp to the fellowship hall in his memory. This wooden ramp was replaced in 1990 with a concrete ramp to match the entrance ramp to the church.

Cooper Flooring Co. installed carpet in the fellowship hall on March 15, 1989 for \$1,280.00. Central air and heat was installed in the church and the fellowship hall for a total of \$2,500.00.

A concrete porch was added to the front entrance with steps and a concrete ramp. The wooden porch and ramp to the fellowship hall was replaced.

**<u>1990</u>** - A&B Center of Upholstery refinished 1 chair, 4 tables and 1 mahogany stand for \$405.00. The church pews were refinished (in walnut) and upholstered (in red fabric) for a total cost of \$4,508.00.

1994 - Stained glass windows were installed in October, 1994.

**<u>1996</u>** - Vinyl siding was added to reduce the upkeep and maintenance of the church. Vinyl was also used for the underpinning.

<u>2004</u>- Hurricane Ivan paid a visit to the Calvert United Methodist Church in 2004. The vinyl underpinning of the church was damaged and replaced with Old Virginia Red brick. The white block sign was also covered in red brick and new letters were installed. The roof of the church was damaged and repaired by Clay Lewis Construction.

**2009** - With a grant from the Sybil H. Smith Charitable Trust and other donations to the capital fund the south porch was enclosed for the purpose of enlarging one of the restroom to meet the handicapped code and a small storage area. The only remaining Sunday school room was remodeled for our young children.

Also, in 2009, the sanctuary was remodeled with capital funds and a \$10,000 contribution by Hilda Woodyard. The paneling used to cover the beaded boards and 4 x 6 boards in 1967 had deteriorated and was replaced with a more durable material. The original columns and ceiling beams were emphasized with larger molding. New carpet was installed with a contribution by Michael & Vanessa Webb, members of the Calvert United Methodist Church.

Two 24" front entrance doors had no protection from the weather; thus, they were often hard to open. They were difficult to use by people in wheel chairs, people with large body frames and people carrying items into the church. Therefore, the two doors were replaced with one large door and a canopy was added so that one could step outside the church and still be protected from the weather.

**<u>1986</u>** - E. Carpenter refinished and repaired alter rail (3 sections) for \$275.00. The alter rail is a focal point in the church.

On August 28, 1986 the pulpit was refinished and repaired for \$150.00.

**<u>1986</u>** - Lee Parnell installed vinyl under pinning on 4/23/86 for \$700.00. This under pinning was damaged by Hurricane Ivan and replaced in 1990 with Old Red Virginia brick.

**<u>1989</u>** - The exterior of the church was sanded and loose board replaced.

**<u>1989</u>** - The church was Incorporated.

**1989** - In 1989 the two Sunday school rooms on the north side were remodeled and enlarged to a 28 x 32' fellowship hall. The doors used to enter the Sunday school rooms are now used to enter the fellowship hall. The ceiling still indicates the size of the two Sunday school rooms with beams; however additional space was added to make a room large enough for fellowship events. A porch with canopy was added to enter the fellowship hall. Anita Woodyard Stallings contributed \$10,000 to begin the project; thus the Anita Stallings Fellowship Hall. An additional a\$4,500 was donated to complete the project.

Family & friends of Marion Stabler donated \$180 to construct a wooden ramp to the fellowship hall in his memory. This wooden ramp was replaced in 1990 with a concrete ramp to match the entrance ramp to the church.

Cooper Flooring Co. installed carpet in the fellowship hall on March 15, 1989 for \$1,280.00. Central air and heat was installed in the church and the fellowship hall for a total of \$2,500.00.

**<u>1994</u>** - Stained glass windows were installed in October, 1994.

**2004**- Hurricane Ivan paid a visit to the Calvert United Methodist Church in 2004. The vinyl underpinning of the church was damaged and replaced with Old Virginia Red brick. The white block sign was also covered in red brick and new letters were installed. The roof of the church was damaged and repaired by Clay Lewis Construction.

**2009** - With a grant from the Sybil H. Smith Charitable Trust and other donations to the capital fund the south porch was enclosed for the purpose of enlarging one of the restroom to meet the handicapped code and a small storage area. The only remaining Sunday school room was remodeled for our young children.













# CHIMES DEDICATION AT CALVERT

Sunday, October 25, was one of the most outstanding in the over half century history of Calvert Methodist Church, for on this day several hundred citizens from throughout this area, and from as far away as Louisiana, gathered to hear dedication services for the newly-installed 1700 chimes and to join in homecoming festivities with old friends complete with "dinner on the grounds."

Principal speaker of the day was Congressman Frank W. Boykin, member of the Caivert Church, who, along with George Woodyard, prominent Washington County business man, presented the chimes to the church as a memorial to their respective parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. James Hoykin and the late Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Woodyard, Mr. Boykn spoke during dedication services held Sunday afternoon. He related a bit of history of the Calvert-McIntoshiFairford area in which he grew up and told about the early families of this section.

In introducing M. C. Stallworth, M. Jr., Washington County business man, S. Boykin told that Mr. and Mrs. M. w. C. Stallworth, Sr., were the first couple to be married in the Calvert pr Methodist Church, Mrs. Stallworth is the former Miss Minflie Wilkins.


Mr. Stallworth told those attending that his grandfather gave Congressman Boykin his first job—that of water boy. He told how Mr. Boykin rapidly worked his way up into positions of responsibility and he related several anecdotes about the Congressman's early life.

Rev. I. W. Chalker preached sermon at the morning hour.

Introducing the local congressman was Circuit Judge Joe M. Petham, Jr., of Chatom, Judge Pelham spoke of the early days around the Fairford area and told of the men from there who had grown into prosperous and successful business men during the past 50 years.






Anniversary 100 Years - 1889-1989 Dedication of Fellowship Hall








3) INTERIOR OF CHURCH AFTER IT WAS REMODELED IN 2009.
