Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Description: This plantation cemetery, used between 1826 and 1872, contains 22 graves, markers, and monuments and is located on land first purchased by Thomas Bevin Creagh in 1819 from the federal government and kept in the family until 1902.

The Cemetery is sited in a wooded area about 1/4 mile from the ruins of the old Creagh family plantation house, location of the last home of Thomas B. Creagh. The brick used for the foundation and chimneys were fired with an unusual robin's-egg-blue glaze. In the 1930s, a small wire fence and gate were added to keep out cattle but is no longer evident. Presently unfenced, the cemetery is at the top of the north west slope of a high ridge falling off to Glover's Creek. The area is surrounded by farm land, woods, and pastures. At one time, three large Creagh plantations adjoined each other at this location, covering several thousand acres and operated by Thomas B. Creagh and three of his sons (described below).

The monuments are predominantly marble with elaborate, extensive inscriptions. They are in varying conditions. Some monuments have carved relief work in a Greek revival design; one in Gothic revival. Five of the Italian marble box tombs are identical in style; with clipped slab corners and decorative pillars. A sixth tomb may have been destroyed as there are pieces scattered about the cemetery and outside the area. Family members report that the inscriptions at one time contained gold leaf. There also is an obelisk, a neoclassic pillar, several tablet markers, simple table tombs, and a few headstones.

Brief History of Cemetery: The cemetery was probably established in 1826 at the untimely death of T.B. Creagh's fourth son, Richard P. Creagh, 1796 - 1826, a graduate of South Carolina College, an ardent Whig, counsellor and attorney-at-law. In the years following, many family members were buried here among them: wife Rebecca Walthall Creagh, 1765 - 1830; another son Dr. Edward B. Creagh, 1800 - 1834; second wife Winifred Whitonel Alston Harris (1789 - 1839), widow of Henry Harris and daughter of William J. Alston of Clarke County; Sarah Harris Creagh, 1821 - 1840, the young wife of his son Dr. Memorable Walker Creagh; T. B. Creagh himself. 1771 - 1842; his oldest son Judge John Gates Creagh, 1792 - 1843; his niece Rebecca Patton, 1793 - 1855; and her two sons, James and Thomas Patton. It is not known if these Pattons are related to Robert M. Patton, elected Governor of Alabama and served briefly in 1865. Another son, Alexander Milton Creagh, 1809 - 1854, also buried in this cemetery with his first wife, Ann D. Howze (Howse) Creagh, was a wealthy planter who served as administrator of his father's and brothers' estates at the time of their deaths until his own untimely death in 1854. Another son, Edward B. Creagh M.D., 1800 - 1834, died shortly after establishing himself following graduation from University of Pennsylvania in 1827 and is buried here, too.

After the death of Judge John G. Creagh, his widow inherited a portion of the plantation lands and later married Judge A.B. Cooper. The Sterling family, descendents of Judge Cooper, and other Creagh descendents owned the lands until 1902. For this reason, on some maps the cemetery is identified as the "Cooper Cemetery" or "the old Sterling place" although no Coopers or Sterlings are buried there.

Overview of the Creagh Family: The patriarch of the Alabama branch of this family, Thomas Bevin Creagh, is buried in this cemetery. Between 1812 and 1854 he and his sons contributed significantly to the early development of Alabama. Son of a colonial soldier, John Creagh of Ireland who fought with General Braddock in the battle of Monongahella in 1755, T. B. Creagh was born August 2, 1771 in Sussex County, Virginia and christened June 28, 1772, according to the Albermarle Parish Register. Married to Rebecca Walthall, daughter of Gerard Walthall and his wife Susanna of Elbert County, Georgia, T. B. Creagh, his wife and six sons lived on a 900 acre plantation on the Savannah River near Elbert County, Georgia and in Abbeville, South Carolina until 1820. After his sons were raised and educated in South Carolina and he had made his first fortune, he moved his family to Alabama where his two oldest sons had already established themselves in Clarke County in 1812 and 1813. T. B. Creagh was active in the settlement of Alabama before that final move however. In December 1814, he was one of 11 trustees who established the first chartered school in Alabama, Washington Academy, in St. Stephens. Although he had purchased his first land in 1819 in Wilcox County, his first homestead probably was near Suggsville in Clarke County, as he was a member of the Suggsville Marion Masonic Lodge, #23 in 1823. In 1827 he moved to Wilcox County where he served as Master of the Dale Lodge #25. In 1829 to 1831 he served as Grand Master of the Masonic Grand Lodge in Montgomery. His wife died in 1830 and in 1831 he married second Winifred Whiton Alston Harris (1789 - 1839), widow of Henry Harris and daughter of William J. Alston of Clarke County.

T.B. Creagh's six sons, like their father, were successful planters and distinguished leaders in the early history of Alabama. The oldest son, Judge John Gates Creagh, buried in this cemetery, was a town commissioner and Treasurer of Jackson, Alabama when it was founded in 1815. He was a founder of the town of Suggsville in 1819; an early trustee of the University of Alabama, 1826-1828; Commissioner and Probate Court judge for Clarke County 1821 -1823; and a state legislator in 1823-1825 and 1831-1833. T.B. Creagh's second son, State Senator Gerard Walthall Creagh fought with Sam Dale and Jeremiah Austill in the Creek and Indian Wars, 1812-1813, was commissioned by Governor William Bibb into the volunteer regiment known as the "Jackson Blues" in 1818, and represented Washington and Clarke Counties in the Alabama legislature from 1819 until his death in 1840. Another son, Dr. Memorable Walker Creagh, whose first wife is buried in the cemetery, was a successful planter and served in the Alabama legislature representing Marengo County in 1849-1850 and 1953-1854.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The monuments and grave markers in this family cemetery reflect several distinct architectural designs characteristic of the opulent plantation culture between 1830 and 1860: Greek Revival, Gothic Revival, Italian marble box tombs with decorative pillars and clipped slab corners, obelisks, table tombs, and tablet markers. Jarvis Turner, noted marble dealer and monument maker from Mobile, is known to have made several of these in 1847 and 1854. The cemetery also contains several simple inscribed granite headstones, reflective of the economic downturn of the plantation economy immediately after the Civil War. As a reflection of the life and times of a large and extended plantation family that produced several prominent men in public life, the cemetery is a micro-chronicle of the period of Alabama history from the time the state was formed until the outbreak of the Civil War.

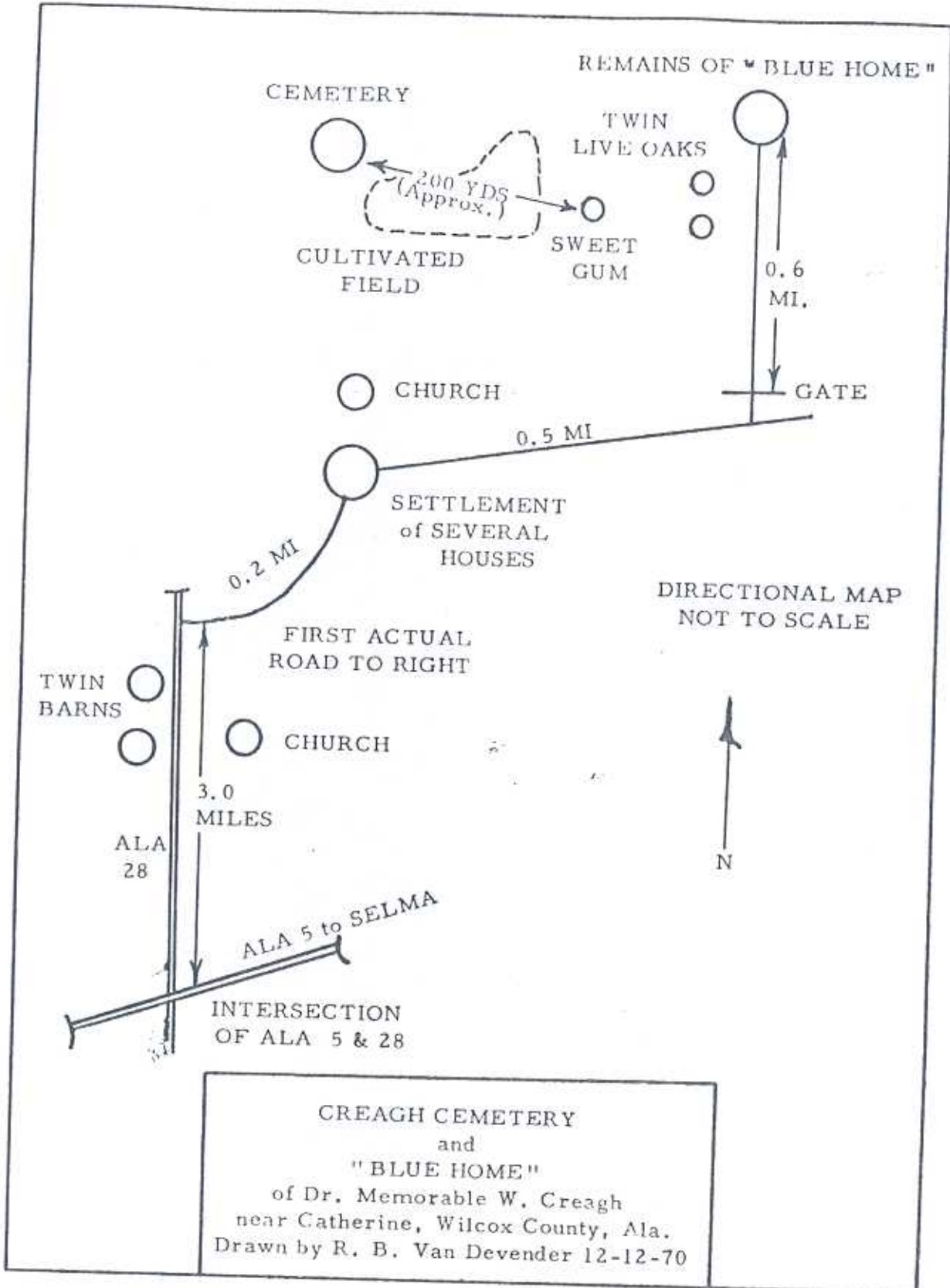

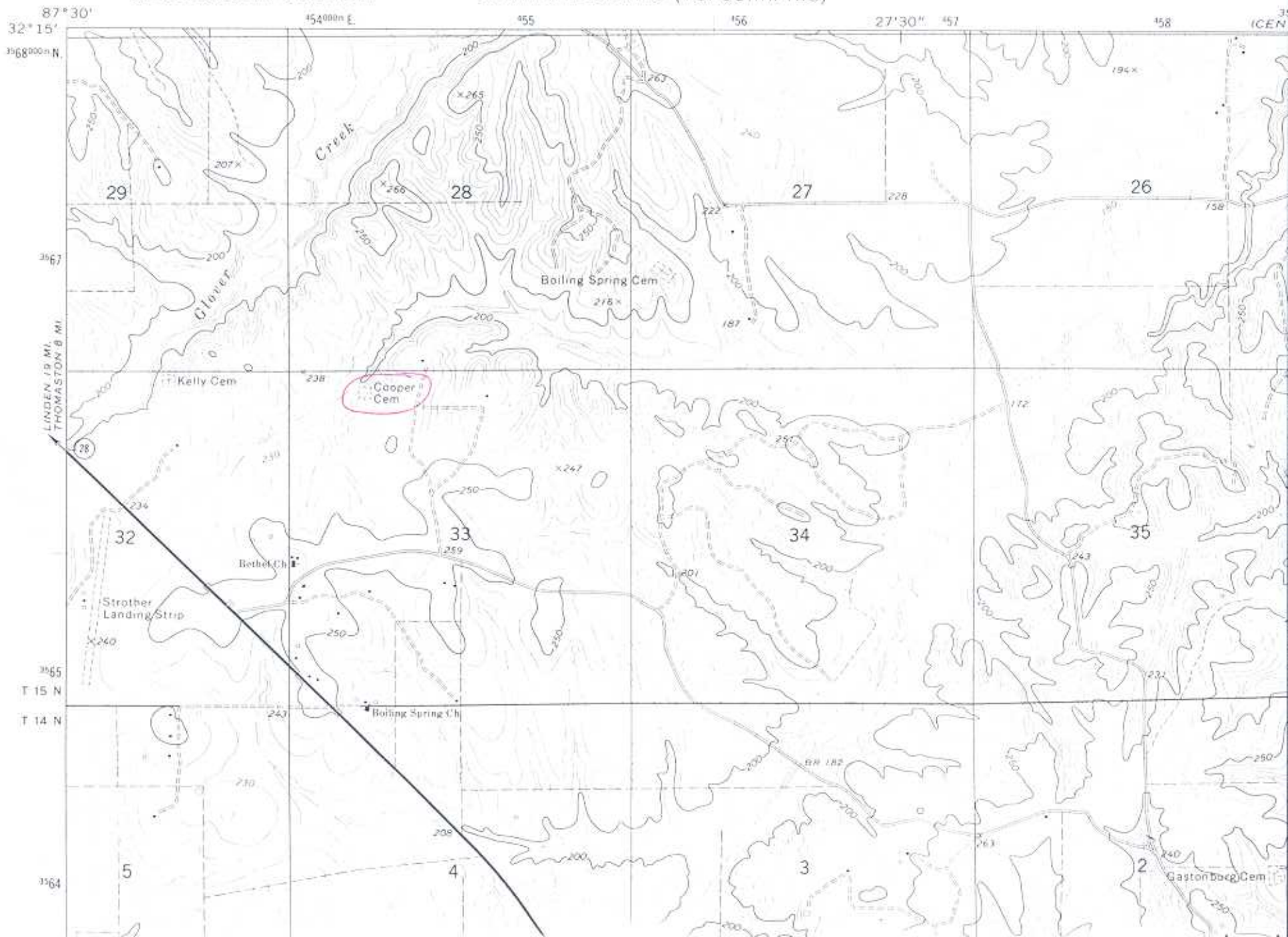

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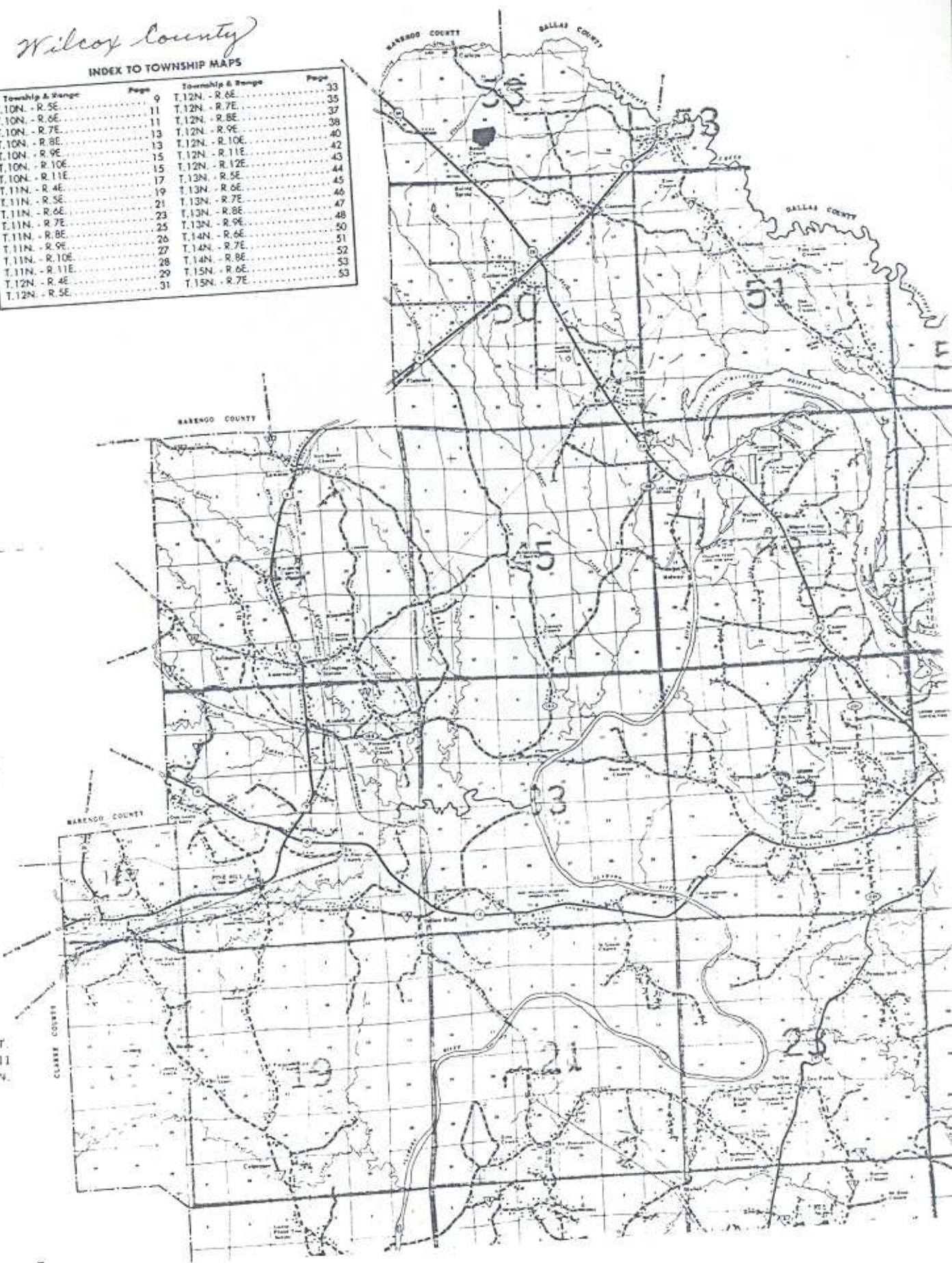

On March 22, 1991, the Creagh Family Cemetery near Catherine, Wilcox County, was added to your Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage Cemeteries. The family was so pleased to have this interesting and significant site recognized in this manner. Since that time we have been preserving the marble box tombs that had been vandalized over the years, with help from the Creagh Family Cemetery Trust, the Clarke County Historical Society, and the contributions of individual family members.

In the process of doing this preservation and restoration work, we have identified several other graves and markers belonging to ancestors of the Glover family. The present-day Glovers of Newnan and West Point, Georgia, are interested in assisting us with the restoration work. We have discovered the graves and markers of the following Glovers:

Major Benjamin Glover, 1803 - 1872,

his wife: Amanda Hughes Glover, 1808 - 1858

[Their daughter, Willie Shields Glover married Alexander M. Creagh of Moss Grove Plantation, Wilcox County who also is buried in this cemetery. She married second, Major William H. Ketchum (1821- 1895) of Mobile.]

their daughter: Lucilla Glover, 1842- 1854

their son: John F. Glover, 1828-1858

granddaughter: Amanda Glover, 1859-1866, eldest daughter of Nathaniel B. and Caroline Frances Clarke Glover

granddaughter: Mary Glover, 1866-1868, another daughter of N & C Glover

It seems both appropriate and accurate to change the name and re-identify the cemetery as the CREAGH - GLOVER CEMETERY. Both the Creaghs and the Glovers are in support of this. I hope you will be able to help us make the change official. I look forward to hearing from you about this.
