Architect or Builder (Give name and biographies, if known) Supposedly designed by Dr. Watson. Probably aided by local carpenters, as there are several other houses in the city which have some of the same exterior details.

(USE ADDITIONAL SHEETS IF NECESSARY) Built by Dr. James Crawford Watson and wife Edna as a residence in 1913. Also served as infirmary for Dr. Watson, a medical doctor. First appendent in Georgiana performed there in 1913, shortly after building was completed. After Dr. Watson's death in 1926, Mrs. Watson continued to live in the building, and rented out rooms to boarders. In 1966 the property was sold by Mrs. Watson to A.E. and Jean Booker. The property was purchased from them by the City of Georgiana in 1982. Dr. J.C. Watson was a member of a noted family in the area, which produced several physicians. Several persons who were later prominent in the business life of Georgiana boarded in the home of Mrs. Watson when they first arrived in the city.

Second floor: diamond panes over one, 9: 2 over 2, 9: 4 over 4, 8: 1 over 1, 1.

Interior: Describe mantels, stairways, wainscoting, plasterwork and any unusual feature Wainscoting, stairway, door and window frames and mantels in residential section of dark-stained heart pine. Terra cotta tiles around fireplace in reception room; yellow glass tiles around parlor fireplace; green glass tiles around dining room fireplace. Dining room mantel has leaded glass doors. Dentil molding-type plate rail in dining room. Stairway has catwalk landing. Residential area wallcovering of painted muslin. Infirmary has tongue-&-groove horizontal board walls, stairway, and floors all of heart pine. Pine flooring in residential part; has four pocket doors; beamed ceiling in reception room; chimneys enclosed within walls. Original piping for carbide lights remains in residential portion.



Small upstairs porch over front entrance has been removed. Former back porch was enclosed and three rooms added above for surgery. After Dr. Watson's death, structure was converted to apartments and baths and kitchenettes added.
