

CONDENSED HISTORY OF FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH * ENTERPRISE

RECEIVED

The present structure used by Enterprise First United Methodist Church as its sanctuary is the third building erected for its worship services.

Methodists living in and around the small village to become known as Enterprise first began meeting in Alberson's schoolhouse (about one mile east of the present church). This was

in 1883.

That same year, during summer months, services were held under a brush arbor at Main and East Lee streets. As colder weather approached, Enterprise Mission or Charmichael's Chapel became a reality and members prepared to erect a new church building. Thirteen members organized the new church and all thirteen, including women, participated in the erection of the original building. The building was placed on a lot provided by John Henry Carmichael (founder of Enterprise) on the east side of Main Street near the city cemetery.

As membership grew, it became necessary to have a larger meeting place. In 1893, using a lot on the west side of Main Street,

a 35x50 foot building was erected for \$600.

Enterprise's population continued to grow, business expanded, and industry began to come into the fledgling town, especially after the railroad arrived. A larger church building was needed again. The church bought a lot on Main Street at Chancey Street from Monroe Chancey for \$600. Construction startedd on the new building on August 1, 1903 and the first sermon was preached on September 4, 1904. Members met at the frame structure on No-th Main and 'paraded' down Main Street to their new church 'home.' The masonry building cost \$10,000. This is the building proposed to be added to the Registry.

In 1923, an Austin pipe organ was installed and serves

the congregation today.

The first annex was added in 1923 at a cost of \$20,000. Electric wiring was replaced in the building in 1927 and new lights were installed. Paving of Main Street was done in 1919. Later, Chancey Street was paved.

In 1940, a new heating system was installed.

Camp Rucker opened near Enterprise in 1942, to train
troops for service in World War II. The Church ministry became
involved in service to the troops and was influenced by the troops.

The second annex was added in 1949 and the sanctuary

was remodeled at the same time for a cost of \$50,000.

In February 1950, the church board purchased the Weldon

Thompson property just back of the church plant.

Air conditioning arrived for the auditorium and a few other areas of the church in the early 50s. And in March of 1954, still another annex was added to the church at a cost of \$37,932.

Having earlier assisted in establishing Southside Methodist Church, the church also assisted in an expansion to that church (now known as St. Paul Methodist Church) and in the organization of another - St. Luke Methodist Church.

The first woman to serve on the Board of Stewards was

during the period 1952-57. In January, 1956, Dr. C. Byrd Harbour, pastor at the time, exchanged pumpits with Rev. Earnest Hardy of Bramhall, Cheshire, England, for three months.

In 1956, the complete church plant was air-conditioned. The board purchased the Owen property in March, 1959. The property was owned by Arnie Brown who agreed to sell for \$12,000. The board then gave the buildings on the property to the Johns Chapel AME Church for use in their building program.

A Fellowship Hall was erected on the Owens property in 1963. Also in 1963, improvements were made to the main buildings, such as outside painting, inside painting, refinished floors, paneled wainscoating in the auditoroum, improved vestibules,

rearranged choir area, and carpeted floors.

In 1965, Enterprise State Junior College was organized in the church building. The first classes were held in the church until the college campus could be built and made ready for students.

In 1966, the exterior was redecorated. On March 27, 1969, a fire on the first floor of the santuary caused \$58,000 damage. It was thought to be caused by a wiring problem. The sanctuary was completely renovated. As a par t of the renovation, 1970, the WSCS bought two matching chandoliers from Germany. One chandolier has 52 bulbs.

In 1979-80, the heat-cooling system was reworked. While the work was going on, fire broke out on a Sunday morning in an attic and around a light bulb. The building was evacuated and the

fire was put out without water damage.

In August 1970, the remainder of the Thompson property

was purchased for \$18,000.

In June, 1973, \$40,000 was authorized for the renovation of the church buildings. In early 1974, the board discussed painting, inside and outside, re-roofing, recovering the steeple with metal and adding a new cross, improving the front entrance by enlarging the porch and steps, new exterior doors, and handrails. When the work was coleted, the cost was \$60,000.

Since 1974, the Schulmarich Carillon Bells toll daily for everyone to hear. The system was given by nieces and nephews in honor of Mrs. R.S. Boyd and in memory of Ridgeway Boyd.

(n 1979, the heating and air-conditioning were reworked.

The Vestibules were redecorated in 1983.

The estimated value of this church property - buildings and land - is now in excess of \$1 million.

DESCRIPTION OF BUILDING

Sited on the corner of South Main and Chancey Streets, the First United Methodist Church of Enterprise was founded in 1903. This gray stuccoed building is characteristic of the Gothic style. With its steeply pitched roof and gothic stained glass windows, it typifies Methodist churches of this period.

The congregation enters the church through the base of a large spire topped with a small cross. This gray metal element is visible throughout Enterprise.

The interior of the sanctuary is reminiscent of Tudor construction: stuccoed walls, large hewn beams, arched windows and brass chandeliers characterize the interior space. The windows are stained glass composition, geometric in nature but generally consisting of a four petaled flower. The exposed beam truss and deeply hewed wood panels offer a contrast to the soaring stuccoed walls. The very voluminous space shaped through sloping floors and high pitched seilings which lend a vertical focus to the altar area.

Adjoining the church are educational facilities which repeat the stuccoed look to create a clustered effect.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE of Enterprise First United Methodist Church Enterprise, Ala.

The Enterprise First United Methodist Church has much historical significance to the City of Enterprise. It was the first church - The Mother Church - in that is today a city of almost 20,000 people. The Enterprise First Baptist Church was organized within the walls of the original Methodist Church building.

In the present building, erected in 1903, the church has provided for the needs of Enterprise through diversity and necessity. When the city school burned, it was the First Methodist Church that provided space for classes to continue. When Enterprise State Junior College organized, it was at First Methodist Church where ESJC held its first classes until buildings could be erected on the college site.

Throughout the history of Enterprise, Enterprise First United Methodist Church has been in the forefront spiritually, civically, and in most any way the occasion demanded. One of the oldest buildings in Enterprise, it has seen history made within its walls and deserves to be placed on the Alabama Registry and National Registry.

It is also a splendid example of Gothic architecture one of the few examples in Enterprise - and deserves
preservation and placement on the Registry for this
reason, also.
