Old Cahawba HymnFest draws large crowd from Dallas County area

A large crowd filled the historic St. Luke's Church at Old Cahawba Archaeological Park on September 24, with a singing of hymns during the first-ever HymnFest. The event drew almost 200 people from across Dallas County and other nearby communities to share the sacred hymns of the church from several faith traditions. Pastor Jerry Light from Selma Community Church gave the opening prayer. Singers from Selma led the hymn sing-along, beginning with "Holy Holy Holy", "Just a Little Talk with Jesus," and ended with "I'll Fly Away," written by a sharecropper's son in 1932 while he was picking cotton in Spiro, Oklahoma.

"It was amazing to see and hear so many people singing the old hymns within the walls of Cahawba's historic St. Luke's Episcopal/Azion Baptist church," said Old Cahawba Site Director Linda Derry. "I was overjoyed to be part of a diverse crowd gathered together to sing, celebrate, and heal...it was very satisfying to see so many people finding meaning and relevance in the stories associated with both the historic church and the hymns."

The free event was sponsored by the Black Belt Treasures Cultural Arts Center in Camden, the Daniel Foundation of Birmingham, Thrivent Financial, Old Cahawba, and the Alabama Historical Commission.

Old Cahawba Archaeological Park lies at the confluence of the Alabama and Cahaba Rivers. From 1819 to 1826, it served as Alabama's first capital. Old Cahawba is a historic property of the Alabama Historical Commission. To learn more, call 334-872-8058 or visit Old Cahawba here.

September was a busy month for AHC preservation staff with two workshops. One workshop was held in Dadeville for historic tax credits. AHC staff spoke on the economic benefits of rehabilitating historic properties, state and federal tax incentives available to historic property owners, and the success stories of recently rehabilitated properties. The second workshop was held in LaFayette by the LaFayette Historic Preservation Board where AHC staff discussed the steps in preserving historic structures and ways in

Confederate Memorial Park hosts October cemetery tour

Confederate Memorial Park, a historical property of the Alabama Historical Commission, will host a special cemetery tour on October 21, at 10:00 am. By 1865, there was hardly a family in Alabama unaffected by the loss or incapacitation of a loved one. For many years after the war, it was a common sight throughout the nation to see veterans with an empty sleeve or trouser leg or hobbling along on crutches or in a wheelchair. The many boneshattering wounds made amputation a common procedure, and many other veterans suffered from ailments exacerbated by years of war campaigns and limited medical treatments. Told through a medical lens, visitors will learn about the lives of veterans buried at the Soldiers' Home and how war-time wounds and ailments were treated during and after the war.
